

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# Part One. Social Security Expenditure

### I. Notes on the expenditure statistics

- 1. The scope of *social security expenditure* in this publication is based on the ILO (International Labor Office) standards for international comparison. The ILO defines as all the schemes or services which meet the following three criteria:
- i) The objectives of the schemes must be-
  - (a) to grant curative or preventive medical care;
  - (b) to maintain income in case of involuntary loss of earnings or of an important part of earnings; or
  - (c) to grant a supplementary income to persons having family responsibilities.
- ii) The system must have been set up by legislation which attributes specified individual rights to, or which imposes specified obligations on, a public, semi-public or autonomous body.
- iii) The system should be administered by a public, semi-public or autonomous body. However, where the liability for the compensation of employment injuries is imposed directly on the employer, the schemes for employment injury compensation are included in the scope of *social security expenditure* even if they do not meet criterion iii) above.

On the basis of the criteria listed above, the following schemes are included in these statistics: social insurance (including unemployment insurance and employment injury compensation insurance), family allowances, special schemes for public employees, public health service, public assistance, social welfare schemes, and aid for war victims.

Note: These statistics are reported to the ILO every year as the official figures for Japan. Japan's tables presented in ILO web page is not identical to the ones we publish here. ILO eliminated Japan's data for "public health" from our original table by their own sake. We can not accept the elimination because "public health" includes all health care and disease prevention costs paid from general government budgets, and they must be included according to the ILO criteria i) (a) to grant curative or preventive medical care, above.

- 2. Social Security Expenditure is divided into medical care, pensions, and others;
- i) *Medical care* includes medical services provided under various health insurance schemes, health services system for the aged, medical services for Workmen's

- Accident Compensation Insurance, medical services for public assistance and government-financed special medical services, such as the treatment of tuberculosis and mental disorders, public health services, etc.
- ii) Pensions includes payments by all the public pension schemes such as National Pensions, Employees' Pension Insurance, etc. It also includes some cash benefits paid in the form of pensions within the scheme of gratuities for retired civil servants and the scheme for Workmen's Accident Compensation Insurance.
- iii) Others includes public assistance other than medical services, cash benefits for child allowance, expenses for social welfare services, sickness and injury cash benefits within the health insurance schemes, leave compensation benefits paid by the Workmen's Accident Compensation Insurance, unemployment benefits from Employment Insurance, etc.

#### II. Summary of statistics

- 1. The Social Security Expenditure in the fiscal year of 1995 was 64,726.4 billion yen.
  - i) Of the three categories, *medical care* was estimated at 24,059.2 billion yen and its share of the total was 37.2 per cent. *Pensions* was 33,498.6 billion yen and its share 51.8 per cent. *Others* was 7,168.6 billion yen and its share 11.1 per cent.
  - ii) Social Security Expenditure increased by 7.0 per cent in the fiscal year of 1995. The percentage share of the National Income was 17.1 per cent.
  - iii) Social Security Expenditure per head of population was estimated at 515,500 yen, and the average expenditure per household 1,502,400 yen.
- 2. The Social Security Expenditure for the aged (i.e., retirement pensions, medical care for the aged, and welfare services for the aged) was 40,710.9 billion yen. Its share of the Social Security Expenditure was 62.9 per cent.

Figure 1. Social Security Expenditure by category, fiscal years 1970-95





Social Security Expenditure was reclassified according to our definition of three categories. *Others* refers to the residuals after deducting *medical care* and *pensions* from the total. Method of reclassification is as follows:

- 1) U.S.A.: Medical care = Grand total of medical care
  - *Pensions* = Cash benefits under selected schemes (e.g., old age and survivors' insurance, disability insurance, railroad retirement, public employee retirement, veterans' programs)
- 2) U.K.: Medical care = Grand total of medical care
  - Pensions = Cash benefits under selected schemes (e.g., old age retirement pensions, invalid insurance, survivors' insurance, public employees, military pensions)
- 3) Germany: Medical care = Grand total of medical care
  - Pensions = Cash benefits under selected schemes (e.g., pensions, pensions for public employees, war victims relief)
- 4) France: Data taken from another source due to difficulty of dividing the ILO data into three categories.



## Part Two. Social Security Revenue

#### I. Notes on the revenue statistics

- 1. The total social security receipts are divided into eight sources of revenue in accordance with the ILO standards. These sources include (1) Contributions from insured persons, (2) Contributions from employers, (3) Special taxes, (4) State participation, (5) Other public authorities, (6) Income from capital, (7) Other receipts and (8) Revenue transferred from other schemes. Japan has not introduced revenue sources (3), but some countries (e.g., the U.S.A., France) have. A reference to (8) is necessary to avoid double accounting. revenue (8) is excluded from the Social Security Revenue in the following statistics. (4) State participation includes central government transfer for social security benefits and various subsidies to supplement the administrative costs of social security schemes. (5) Other public authorities denotes local authorities, such as prefectures, cities, towns, and villages, and includes various subsidies which they provide for each scheme. (6) Income from capital includes the interest and charge receipts from facilities run by each scheme. (7) Other receipts includes the miscellaneous receipts and various revenue carried over from the previous year. (8) Transfer from other schemes includes transactions made to provide financial support to the National Health Insurance and the Health and medical services for the aged, and to the Basic and Supplementary pension accounts.
- 2. Definitions of *Medical Care, Pensions*, and *Others* are the same as expenditures. (See Part One)

## II. Summary of statistics

1. Total Social Security Revenue in the fiscal year of 1995 was 85,070.9 billion yen. In terms of revenue sources, Contributions from insured persons was 24 trillion 414.6 billion yen, that is 28.7 per cent of the total. Contributions from employers came to 26 trillion 807.5 billion yen, (31.5 per cent). State participation was 16 trillion 568.0 billion yen, (19.5 per cent). Other public authorities' participation was 3 trillion 783.1 billion yen, (4.8 per cent). Income from capital was 9 trillion 811.6 billion yen, (11.5 per cent). Other receipts amounted to 3 trillion 247.3 billion

yen, (3.8 per cent). Total revenue increased by 6.9 per cent from the previous year. The rate of change increased from the previous year. In terms of the relative shares of the sources of revenue, *Contributions of employers* increased by 0.1 per cent and the *state participation* decreased by 0.2 per cent. On the other hand, *Contributions from insured persons* increased by 0.4 per cent from the previous year. Share of the gross domestic products (GDP) was estimated at 17.4 per cent.






Figure 5. International comparison of Social Security Revenue by source
